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DO YOU REMEMBER?

August 2-19, 1918

On August 2nd, the 2nd Battalion, 318th Infantry, which had completed its platoon training on July 31st, was ordered to prepare to effect an independent front line relief at any time after August 5th. Pursuant to these instructions, the 2nd Battalion marched on August 11th from **Beauquesne** to **Varennes**. From this point, reconnoitering parties preceded it to the **Aveluy Wood** sector, held by the 38th (Welsh) Division, which had relieved the 17th (British) Division August 7th, on the right of the 5th Corps front next to the British 4th Army. During the night of August 12th-13th, the Battalion marched from **Varennes** and took over a trench sector of 3,200 yards frontage between **Mesnil** and **Martinsart** from the 14th Battalion, Royal Welsh Fusiliers, 113th Infantry Brigade. This sector embraced the ill-famed **Bois d'Aveluy**, which was still infested by the outposts of the 3rd (German) Naval Division west of the **Ancre River**. It extended from the southern edge of **Aveluy** north to a point about 700 yards southeast of **Mesnil**, and was due west of/and about 2,000 yards from **Thiepval Ridge**. Companies "E" and "G" were assigned to the forward zone in **Aveluy Wood**, on the right and left of the sector respectively, while Companies "F" and "H" held the secondary line, one kilometer to the rear.

At daybreak on August 13th, heavy hostile artillery fire fell upon the left of the Battalion sector, inflicting casualties. Although orders had been given by General Pershing that the American divisions with the British were to engage in no offensive operations, it was deemed advisable to create a diversion at the **Aveluy** bridge-head on the immediate left of the 4th Army, which was heavily engaged, and to determine if the enemy were making withdrawals. Accordingly, the 38th (Welsh) Division undertook a bombardment of the German positions along the **Ancre**, using 200 guns in the artillery fusillade. The 2nd Battalion, which had been directed to wire the trenches in and on the flanks of **Aveluy Wood** opposite **Albert** and **Thiepval**, was now called upon to push its patrols across the **Ancre**. The enemy had just retired across the river, having destroyed all bridges, and concentrated machineguns on all possible crossings. During the next few days, repeated efforts were made by the Battalion and associated British units to force reconnaissance parties and combat patrols across the **Ancre**, strongly held below

Thiepval Ridge. A series of outposts held the railroad paralleling the river, which, because of direct enemy observation, could only be approached at night. During the several attempts made to reach the river, a number of casualties were suffered. On the immediate left of the Battalion, the 14th Wilts of the 21st (British) Division pushed across a company on August 14th, which was immediately wiped out on the face of **Thiepval Ridge**, in plain view of the trench garrisons.

Following an enemy withdrawal, the left division of the British 5th Corps advanced its front line beyond **Beaumont-Hamel**. As a result, the British 38th Division ordered one company on August 15th sent via **Authuille** toward the ridge southwest of **Thiepval** and one company via **Aveluy** toward the road junction about two kilometers to the east, to determine whether the enemy had withdrawn opposite the 38th Division. If no opposition was encountered, the division was to cross the river in force. The 2nd Battalion was to remain with the British 113th Brigade in the front line positions it was then holding. The 115th Brigade of the 38th Division failed August 15th, on the left of the Battalion, to throw a company of Welsh Fusiliers across. Just as a well prepared attempt by the 2nd Battalion, under cover of heavy artillery fire, was getting under way on the night of August 17th, in which boats sent up by the 5th Corps were to be employed, the order for the Battalion to cross the **Ancre** was cancelled.

Before plans for forcing passage of the river were consummated, the Battalion was relieved during the night of August 18th-19th, by the 10th Battalion, South Welsh Borderers, of the 115th Brigade, 38th (Welsh) Division, and marched back to **Varennes**. Despite the enemy attention and concern attracted by the growing activity of the British, which had intensified the severity of its trench experiences, the Battalion sustained a total loss of only one man killed and one officer and 18 men wounded. In addition to the constant patrolling of its front under the most trying conditions, the Battalion during its tour of duty had performed the usual trench routine, including the construction of over 500 yards of communication trenches and the erection of more than 1,000 yards of barbed wire entanglements.

Upon its relief, the Battalion's services received recognition in the form of a letter of generous commendation from the acting British Division Commander.

Due to the 80th Division's withdrawal from the acting British front at this time, the remaining Battalions of the Regiment did not undertake this final period of the training program. The 3rd Battalion had proceeded to Varennes on August 18th, preparatory to occupying a sector of the line, when orders were received directing the troops to return to their billets at Rubempre.

19 States and D. C. Represented At 1957 Reunion

Specific evidence that the 80th Division organization truly is a national association is revealed by a study, by states, of the registration at the 1957 reunion. A total of 19 states and the District of Columbia were represented. Members came to York from such distant points as New Mexico and Florida, Rhode Island and Alabama—plus 15 other states in between these ranges.

With the reunion site being in Pennsylvania, it was natural that the majority of delegates came from that Commonwealth—a total of 56% of all registrants were from the Keystone State. In second place was the adjoining state of Ohio—whose representation comprised 13% of the total. In third place were the Virginia residents who accounted for 10% of the registrations.

New Jersey and Maryland followed close behind in a tie for fourth place. The other states that were represented were, in order, West Virginia, Indiana, New York, Tennessee, Michigan, Massachusetts, Illinois, Connecticut, District of Columbia, New Mexico, Rhode Island, Kentucky, Florida, Alabama and North Carolina.

World War I veterans of the 80th came from 8 separate states; while the World War II contingent had representatives from 18 different states and the District of Columbia.

Attendance at 1957 Reunion 7% Higher than in Previous Year

Attendance at the 1957 reunion in York was some 7% higher than the total for 1956, and was almost 30% greater than the number registered at the 1955 reunion. Some 314 members of the National Association were registered, plus 106 members of the Auxiliary. Considering that there are always some persons who attend but do not register, plus the fact that many couples had brought along one or more of their children, the total attendance in York was in excess of 500 persons.

The percentage breakdown of World War I and World War II men who were registered was almost exactly the same as the previous year: One-third (34%) of the men present had served with the 80th in WW I; and two-thirds (66%) had been members of the ETO 80th.

Our next objective: to surpass this year's total registration when we meet in Harrisonburg, Virginia in 1958!

OFFICIAL AFTER ACTION REPORT

When Lt. General H. L. McBride, 80th Division Commander in WW II, came to York for the 1957 reunion he was kind enough to bring along his copy of the division's Official G-3 After Action Report. This month-by-month summary of the 80th's combat activity was posted on bulletin boards in the reunion hotel and proved to be so interesting that General McBride has made it available to the National Headquarters for reprinting in the Service Magazine.

80th DIVISION AFTER ACTION REPORT

For August, 1944

DISEMBARKATION AND ASSEMBLY

August 3—7

The 80th Division disembarked at Les Dunes Villa Varres (Utah Beach) France. The port of embarkation was Southampton, England. Duration of the voyage was approximately twenty-one hours. Upon arrival in France, a motor movement was made to an assembly area in the vicinity of St. Jores. The 80th Division became a part of the XX Corps and of the Third Army, commanded by Lt. Gen. George S. Patton. The period from 3 August to 7 August was spent in assembling the organizations of the Division and in preparation for further movement.

FORWARD ASSEMBLY AREA

August 8

At 0600 the movement was begun to the Forward Assembly Area W of LE Mans. Reassignment from XX Corps to the XV Corps was made.

MOVEMENT TO SILLE LE**GUILLAUME—August 9-12**

The Division moved on Evron and St. Suzanne. It reconnoitered the area to the E and prepared to occupy Le Mans with one CT.

August 10

CT 317 seized Evron at 1020 and CT 318 occupied St. Suzanne 1000. CT 319 was in Division Reserve. CT 317 was ordered to advance on Conlie while CT 318 was to move on Sille Le Guillaume. Under order of XX Corps, CT 319 was given the assignment to secure a bridgehead at Le Mans and to keep routes of communication open in that vicinity.

August 11

CT 318 seized Sille Le Guillaume at 1200. CT 317 occupied high ground one Km Se Sille Le Guillaume. CT 319 occupied bridgehead at Le Mans.

August 12

CT 318 (—) assembled vicinity Routez in Division Reserve at 1800. Preparations were made for further movement.

MOVEMENT NORTH TOWARD ARGENTAN

August 13—16

CT 317 moved to a concentration area vicinity Evron. FO #4 was issued 0400 for 80th Division (—CT319) to advance Ne in three columns at 0800 to contact and destroy hostile forces encountered, establish contact with XV Corps Armd. Elements, when these elements crossed the Division front.

In accordance with FO #4, CT 318 advanced against scattered enemy resistance to position N of Alencon where it bivouaced for the night. CT 317 advanced against scattered resistance through Villaines to positions S of La Lacelle where it bivouaced for the night. Enemy mine fields were encountered by all advancing elements. Contact with the 2d Fr Armd. Div. was established S of Carrouges.

August 14

80th Division (—CT 319) was ordered to concentration area Evron-Neaul-Les-Bouillons-St. Gemmes Le Robert. 2d Bn, CT 317 (Mtz) preceded Division to concentration area to clear out reported enemy resistance.

August 15

80th Division (—CT 319) closed in the concentration area Evron-Neaul-Les-Bouillons-St. Gemmes Le Robert at 1230. CT 319 moved from Le Mans to Angers to relieve 2d Infantry, 4th Division, from outpost duty vicinity Angers.

August 16

FO #5 directed movement of 80th Division (—CT 319) to a concentration area Brou-Chateaudon-Courtelain in Third Army Reserve. The time for movement was never received and mission was changed.

BATTLE OF ARGENTAN—**FALAISE GAP**

August 17—24

Field Msg #1 changed concentration area in FO #5 to march bivouac in the vicinity of Alencon. FO #6 issued 1800 ordered 80th Division (—CT 319) to attack at 0800 on 18 August and seize the high ground (Hill 213) N of Argentan. CT 318 was to by-pass Argentan and seize the Division Objective, attack Argentan from NE with one battalion and be prepared to continue the attack in the direction of Trun. This order was issued in compliance with a directive of the V Corps of the First Army, to which this Division was assigned for this section. In conjunction with other forces the 80th Division seized Argentan and participated in the closure of the Argen-

tan-Falase Gap and in the final destruction of the German Seventh Army.

August 18

The attack of the 318th Inf jumped off at 0800 in column of battalions 1st, 2d and 3d. By 0905 elements of the 1st Bn were fighting in **Bordeaux** against stiffening resistance which finally halted its forward movement in that vicinity. 2d Bn moved W along the **Argentan-Le-Bourg Leonard Hury** road until held down by fire from **Argentan** and the high ground NE of its position. 3d Bn moved to clean out enemy resistance in the vicinity of **Sai** occupying that locality at 1533. 3d Bn moved to occupy **Bordeaux** and continued the attack at 1700, relieving elements of 1st Bn which reorganized.

After the attack was stopped the 318th Inf adjusted positions as follows: 1st Bn, after reorganization, relieved 3d Bn in **Bordeaux** and the right of 2d Bn which was facing **Argentan**. Plans were made for 318th Inf to continue the attack early on 19 August to seize the Division Objective. 317th Inf moved to a forward assembly area in Corps Reserve. One Bn of 317th Inf. started moving into Division Reserve at 2100.

August 19

The attack jumped off at 0645 with 2d Bn, 318th Inf attacking in the direction of **Argentan**. This advance was halted by hostile fire from the vicinity of **Argentan**. 3d Bn launched attack on the Division Objective at 0700. It met heavy enemy resistance consisting of tanks and infantry and was forced to reorganize in the vicinity of **Vrou** at 1430. 1st Bn was in Regt Reserve in the vicinity of **Bordeaux**.

2d Bn of 317th Inf closed in assembly area S Hill 171 at 0130. It was given the mission of supporting by fire the above mentioned attack of the 3d Bn 318th Inf from Hill 171. 317th Inf passed through the 318th Inf in column of Bns with 2d Bn leading, launching an attack on Division Objective at 1735. Progress was very slow due to heavy fire from the W edge of **Forest Du Gauffern** and the Division Objective. At 2040 advance had progressed SE edge of Objective on southern slope of Hill 213. They were ordered to dig in and resume attack at 0700 on 20 August.

August 20

2d Bn 317th Inf continued attack on Hill 213 and by 0800 was on the Division Objective. 1st Bn followed the 2d Bn to the Division Objective. Both Bn organized positions and sent out combat patrols. 3d Bn advanced N and

turned W and attacked **Argentan** on Division order at 0830. 317th Inf. at 1320 was given the mission of mopping up wooded area in the Division sector from the boundary between the 80th Division and British Forces on the N to include boundary between the 80th Division and the 90th Division on E and as far S as **Crennes** exclusive. 1st Bn 318 was moved to protect Division right flank. It then seized **Crennes** and sent out patrols to establish contact with elements of the 90th Division on the right. The 2d Bn attacked and seized **Argentan** in conjunction with the 3d Bn 317th Inf. 3d Bn reorganized and followed 2d Bn in trace. It then moved S through **Argentan** and occupied positions W of the town.

318th Inf was then ordered at 1330 to complete the mopping up of **Argentan** and clean out woods S of **Crennes** to Division boundary. It was also to clear the E-W highway running across Division sector through **Argentan** of mines and booby traps. CT 319 was relieved on order of **VIII Corps** by CT 329, 83d Division from its mission at **Angers**. It went into assembly area to await further orders.

August 21

The 80th Division was relieved by the 50th Inf Div. (British) and moved to a concentration area S of **Argentan-EXMES Road**. 317th Inf prior to its concentration continued mopping up of enemy resistance in wooded areas within the Division Section N of line **ARGENTAN** and **CRENNES**. 318th Inf continued mopping up of enemy resistance in **ARGENTAN** and woods S. **Crennes** within Division Boundary and their concentration area. CT 31 closed assembly area **Vic Angers** and received orders from **VIII Corps** to move to the vicinity of **St. Calais**. Shuttle movement was begun.

August 22

Concentration of 80th Division in assigned area was completed 0130. 317th Inf outposted the Division area. 80th Cav Ren Tr maintained contact with British N of the Division Concentration Area. CT 319 closed in the vicinity of **Fontaine** at 0200 and received orders from **XII Corps** to move to the vicinity of **Orleans**.

August 23

80th Division (-CT 319) participated in Infantry-Tank and Anti-Tank training. 317th Inf outposted Division area to the N. CT 319 (-) closed in assembly area in the vicinity of **Orleans**.

August 24

80th Division (-CT 319) conducted training in Infantry-Tank coordination.

Movement to the East—August 25-28

FO #7 provided that 80th Division (-CT 319) move to a Concentration Area in vicinity of **Sens (50 miles SE Paris)** 26 August. Preparations completed for movement. Division reverted to Third Army, XII Corps. Movement to **Sens** was completed.

August 27

Division (-CT 319) by FO #8 continued its movement to the E and NE toward the towns of **Plancy** and **Salon**. Isolated hostile resistance was met. FO #9 provided for an advance on 28 August to seize successive objectives, capture **Chalons Sur Marne**, and establish a bridgehead N of **Marnar**.

August 28

80th Division (-CT 319) (-) made a motorized advance from the vicinity of **Plancy** and **Salon** in direction of **Chalons**. 1st Bn CT 319 arrived in the area of **Droupt St. Marie**. Remainder of CT 319 also under Division control was making a shuttle movement closing in this area from old position near **Orleans**.

Capture of Chalons Sur Marne**August 29-31**

The Division Objective of **Chalons** was taken at 1120. The bridgehead was made secure with 317th and 318th Infs disposed on the perimeter and 31th Inf in Division Reserve as directed by Feld Msg #10.

August 30

80th Div moved from vicinity of **Chalons** to **La Veure** in the direction of **Commercy** our new objective. 1st Bn 319th Inf was attached to the 4th Armd Division.

August 31

FO #10 directed that the 80th Div advance E on three (3) routes 0700 seize **Bar Le Duc** (1st Objective), **Commercy** and prepare for action toward **St. Mihiel** and to the E. 317th and 318th Infs were to move motorized in their zone of advance to detrucking points vic **Revigny**, **Villers** and **Laheyourt**. 319th Inf remained in Division Reserve.

Summary

During the month of August, 2172 prisoners were captured and 18 enemy tanks were destroyed.
