On the 7th of December 1944, the US 80th Infantry Division was pulled off the front line in northeastern France and placed into a rest area near the city of Saint Avold. Following four months of continuous contact.

Here, Sergeant Day Turner directed the remaining able bodied men of his squad into new positions on the 2nd floor where in front of the tree line was 170 metres away, German infantry appeared.

From the farm, the US squad opened fire, causing heavy casualties. Smokey exposed German infantry and only had the weight of the American fire to contend with. Also had to wade through snow. That was at times knee deep.

Unlike the first, this new assault was coordinated with the Germans laying down the smokescreen to cover their advance while targeting the farmhouse with both tank and water fire.
